Palestine Film Festival Santiago, Chile June 23-29, 2014

Connecting North and South America through Palestinian film, CPS organized a week-long film festival curated by our former Fellow, Noemi Artal, who for a number of years has run a similar festival in Madrid. Relying on the support of the new Columbia Global Centers | Latin America (Santiago), the event also was attended by Professor Safwan Masri, Executive Vice President for Global Centers and Global Development at Columbia University and Carol Becker, the Dean of the School of the Arts. Post-screening discussions were facilitated by colleagues from the Arab Studies Center, University of Chile. The festival welcomed the participation of Miguel Littin, the prominent Chilean filmmaker, who is of Palestinian descent. Also on hand, and performing, was the internationally known

Chilean hip-hop artist Ana Tijoux, who has a video in which she


performs with Palestinian video artist, Shadia Mansour.

New Case Developments: Suspending Land & Housing Rights and Threatening Political Participation of Palestinian Citizens of Israel

October 13, 2014 - in partnership with Adalah

As the centerpiece of its longstanding commitment to legal perspectives, CPS has partnered for two years with Adalah, The Legal Center for Arab Minority Rights In Israel (based in Haifa). This fall's activity focused on a closed workshop with invited guests from the Columbia legal community and a contingent from the UN. Suhad Bishara, a principal attorney at Adalah is in residence with us this year as a Palestine Law Fellow. She and Hassan Jabareen, the founder and head of Adalah, presented their analyses of two legal developments, one concerning property rights, the other concerning the banning of an Arab woman Member of the Knesset.


History of the Present

War on Gaza: Military Strategy and Historical Horizons

Palestine South Africa Moment? The Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions Movement

December 2, 2014

CPS hosted a founder of the international Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement, Omar Barghouti, who spoke to a packed audience. In addition to remarks by Professors Abu El-Haj

and Khalidi, the other main speaker of the evening was CPS faculty member Professor Mahmood Mamdani, a world authority on Africa, who spoke, in comparative terms, about the history of the anti-apartheid movement in South Africa.
